

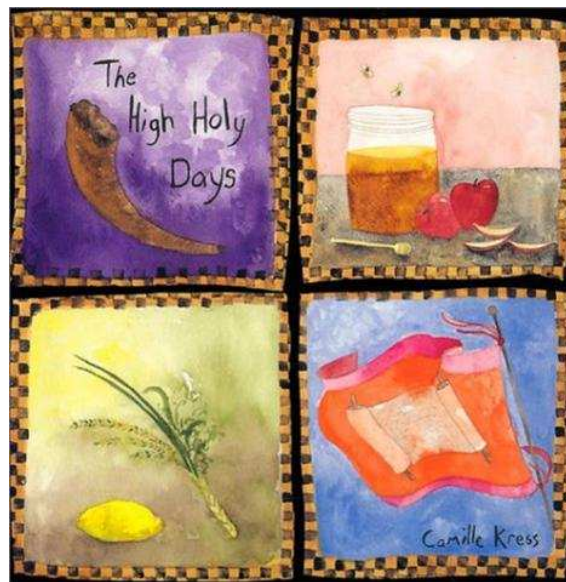

It is that wonderful time of year once again, time to prepare for the New Year. And...it certainly came early! We look forward to spending the holiday together with you. This info packet is intended to explain everything you ever wanted to know about the holidays at CBE. Please take a moment to read it. ## **FAQ: Frequently Asked Questions**

### **TICKETS**

**Q: When, where & how do I use my tickets?**

**A:** Please show your tickets when you enter the synagogue for holiday services.

You need to have them with you at all services, except:

- 2<sup>nd</sup> Day of RH
- Children's Services on Rosh Hashanah & Yom Kippur
- Afternoon services on YK

**Q: Where are tickets for my children?**

**A:** Tickets are issued for the adult members of your household.

- For adult children 18+, complete form "Family Guest Tickets" and we will mail you the tickets.
- Children < 18 do not require tickets.

## PARENTS

**Q: What programs/services are available for my children?**

**A:** See enclosed “Youth Programming at CBE – A Guide for the High Holidays at CBE”

## PARKING

**Q: Where do I park?**

**A:** Park at CBE in designated spaces.

CBE Parking Lot: There are 40 paved spaces in our lot.

Overflow lot: Our “overflow” lot can accommodate 10-12 cars, but please park there only if you have 4WD as you may get stuck in the gravel.



**Q: What if there aren't spaces left at CBE?**

**A:** See “SHUTTLE” info below!

- Alternatively, there are approximately 10 spaces on the frontage road directly in front of the Life Care Center.
- Please do not park in the lots of our neighbors or park illegally on the frontage road.

**Q: Can I park at the Rocky Mountain Academy of Evergreen (RMAE) behind the synagogue?**

**A:** At the time this info sheet was prepared, the proposed path between our buildings was not complete. While we have permission to use their parking lot on Yom Kippur (Saturday) please be advised that there is a construction project on their site, and there may be danger to your tires from nails. Unless the path is completed before the

holidays, we discourage the use of their parking lot during evening services since there are no lights. We **may not** use the RMAE parking lot at **any time during school hours on Rosh Hashanah Day 1 or 2.**

## SHUTTLE

### Q: What is the Shuttle?

A: The holiday shuttle is a Senior Resource Center bus that runs from the former Albertson's parking lot at Stagecoach and Evergreen Parkway.



### Q: When does it run?

A: The shuttle will begin picking up passengers 45 minutes prior to the start of the following services. It will run continuously until after the conclusion of services.

- Erev Rosh Hashanah (Wed. 9/8).  
Service begins at 7PM; shuttle begins 6:15 PM.
- Rosh Hashanah Morning, through luncheon (Thur. 9/9). Service begins at 9:30 AM; shuttle begins 8:45 AM.
- Kol Nidre (Fri., 9/17). Service begins at 7PM; shuttle begins 6:15 PM.
- Yom Kippur Morning (Sat., 9/18). Service begins at 9:30 AM; shuttle begins 8:45 AM.

The shuttle **will not run** on 2<sup>nd</sup> day of Rosh Hashanah.

## FOOD

### **Q: What is the Rosh Hashanah luncheon?**

**A:** It is an opportunity for the community to 'break bread' after services on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. The menu typically includes: bagels & cream cheese; veggies; fruit; kugel; cold drinks; coffee and dessert. Everyone is invited to stay; the luncheon is free, and reservations not required.



### **Q: What is the annual Food Drive?**

**A:** This is the 12<sup>th</sup> year Beth Evergreen has conducted a food drive. The need in our community continues to be great. Please bring a bag (or more) when you come to holiday services. Products especially needed: canned fruits and vegetables - especially corn and tomatoes; spaghetti and tomato sauce; canned soup or packaged Ramen noodles; cooking oil, sugar, flour, coffee and tea; diapers, infant formula and baby food; dry cereals; main meals, especially mac & cheese, and cans or envelopes of tuna; peanut butter and jelly; and personal care items.



### **Q: Is there anyone for me to 'break-the-fast' with on Yom Kippur?**

**A:** Yes! It is a Beth Evergreen tradition for a number of members to host congregational potluck 'break-the-fast' in their homes at various locations throughout the community.

**Q: How do I sign up for a break-the-fast?**

**A:** There will be sign-up sheets in the foyer. Please indicate the # of adults & kids and the potluck dish you will be bringing. Everyone is hungry – so please be sure to bring a generous serving.

## SERVICES

**Q: How are honors / aliyot chosen?**

**A:** We try to represent as much of the congregation as possible. Honors are earned through volunteering your time and talent to CBE. If you would like an honor or wish to participate, please contact Rabbi Jamie or a member of the ritual committee.



**Q: What are the “al cheyts”?**

**A:** A long-standing tradition at CBE is to encourage members to write down our self-improvement goals. By naming some of our past transgressions (and future commitments)., placing them in the communal Al Chet Box, having them read aloud anonymously during Neilah services near the end of Yom Kippur service, and then setting them ablaze, we hope that our mutual witnessing will foster the best of inscriptions in the Book of Life and Blessing in the coming year. ## **VOLUNTEER**

**Q: What can I do to help?**

**A:** We have lots of opportunities! Beth Evergreen runs on volunteer-power.

Some opportunities during the holidays:

- Set up: Join us for an hour to create our sacred space for the holiday: Tuesday, September 7 at 2PM.
- Ushers
- Volunteers (responsible teens or adults) for Rosh Hashanah luncheon
- Kugel Bakers (for Rosh Hashanah Luncheon)
- Help tidy up after the luncheon
- Volunteers (responsible teens or adults) to assist children's programs – 10 minutes; an hour or more!
- Sukkah set up: Monday, September 20 at 4PM
- Sukkah break-down: Wednesday, October 6 at 4PM

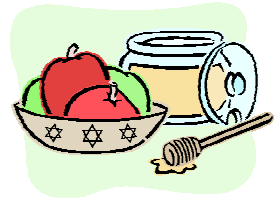
